As Knights of Columbus, we are called to serve those who are less fortunate than ourselves. Basic needs such as food, drink, and respect are required by all people, at all times of the year. In this period between Christmas and Lent, it is often easy to forget about the needs of others. We Knights won't do that. Please join me and the members of your council as we volunteer at Our Daily Bread, a soup kitchen in Sunnyvale. The Worthy Chancellor Bob Rolufs and his wife Lolita have been volunteering at Our Daily Bread for years, and they've arraigned for the Council to have a work day with them on Friday, February 10. The Our Daily Bread dining hall is located at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Sunnyvale at the corner of Sunset and McKinley across from Washington Park. The address is: Our Daily Bread 231 Sunset Avenue Sunnyvale, CA 94086. Please arrive any time after 8:00 a.m., and lunch with those being served will be provided.

Also, Lent will begin shortly, with Ash Wednesday right around the corner on March 1. The Council asks us to once again participate in the 40 Cans for Lent program. To participate, just take one can of food or other non-perishable food item out of your own pantry each Monday through Saturday of Lent, and set it aside to bring to the Council. We will donate the collected food to local programs such as Our Daily Bread or the Second Harvest Food Bank. Collected food can be brought to any Council meeting, social event, or Monday Night Bingo at St. Joseph of Cupertino Parish.

The San Jose Chapter's annual Crab Feed will be on Saturday, February 4, at St. Lawrence the Martyr Parish. If you'd like tickets (\$50 each) please call me. A portion of the proceeds from the Dinner, Dance, and Live and Silent Auctions support the Diocese's religious education programs for people with intellectual disabilities. Council of Lyons II in 1274 A.D.

Held just 29 years after the First Council of Lyons, this Council was held in Lyons instead of Rome because it was easier and less costly for the 560 who attended. It was so much easier that many more arrived than were expected and had to be turned away for lack of space. Unfortunately, St. Thomas Aquinas died on his way to the Council. This Council was unique for it was attended not only by Bishops and Abbots but by representatives of Kings, representatives of Universities, representatives of the Byzantines, and sixteen representatives of the Tartar Abaqa Khan – considered an enemy at the last Council.

The two main reasons for the Council were: reconciliation with the Byzantines, and preparations for a new Crusade against the Muslims but now in concert with the Tartars. (While progress was made toward reconciliation, the majority of lower Byzantine clergy absolutely refused to agree and so the Great Schism continued. The planned Crusade against the Muslims came to nothing.) In addition, 32 Constitutions were passed by the Council and accepted by Pope Gregory X. Among the most interesting are:

Constitution II-1. (Because it took three years to elect Pope Gregory X, the following rules for papal elections were promulgated.) If a pope dies in a city where he was residing with his curia, the cardinals present in that city are obliged to await the absent cardinals, but only for ten days. When these days have passed, whether those absent have arrived or not, all are to assemble in the palace where the pope lived. Each is to be content with one servant only, clerical or lay, at choice. In this palace all are to live in common in one room, with no


partition or curtain. Apart from free entry to a private room, the conclave is to be completely locked, so that no one can enter or leave. No one may have access to the cardinals or permission to talk secretly with them, nor are they themselves to admit anyone to their presence. Whoever acts otherwise, sending a messenger or a written message, or speaking secretly to one of the cardinals, is to incur automatic excommunication. In the conclave some suitable window is to be left open through which the necessary food may be served conveniently to the cardinals, but no entry for anyone is to be possible through this way.

If, which God forbid, within three days after the cardinals have entered the said conclave, the church has not been provided with a shepherd, they are to be content for the next five days, every day both at dinner and supper, with one dish only. If these days also pass without the election of a pope, henceforth only bread, wine and water are to be served to the cardinals until they do provide a pope.

Constitution II-23. We absolutely forbid all forms of religious life and the mendicant orders which have not merited confirmation of the apostolic see, and we suppress them in so far as they have spread. Of course we do not allow the present constitution to apply to the orders of Preachers (Dominicans) and Minors (Franciscans); their approval bears witness to their evident advantage to the universal church. Furthermore, we grant that the order of Carmelites and that of the Hermits of Saint Augustine may remain as they are, until other regulations are made for them.

Candlemas

Looking at our Catholic calendar for 2017, I noticed that February 2 was emblazoned with the words, "Presentation of the Lord," in bold letters. Under it in unbolded letters was, "Groundhog Day." A little investigation into this feast showed that before Vatican II it was called "Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary, or Candlemas" in the Latin Rite.

This feast has been celebrated in the Catholic Church since the early fourth century. In the west it was focused on the purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary but in the east it was focused on the presentation of Jesus in the temple. Today, the feast is focused on Jesus in both east and west. The two lungs of the Church are now breathing together, at least on this feast.

Since the 11th century the Candlemas ritual of blessing candles has taken place each February 2nd. The candles are to be made of beeswax or have some beeswax in them. (See the column on "Minding our Beeswax" for a deeper meaning of candles.) At times there was a procession of blessed, lighted candles signifying that Christ's light is going out through the whole world.

But why is Groundhog Day on the same day?

A few years ago I wrote to a San Francisco Chronicle music critic about his review of a concert that was composed of chant from the Middle Ages drawn from the liturgy of the hours for the feast of Candlemas. His response included a citation from the Encyclopedia Britannica regarding a medieval saying that went something like this:

If Candlemas be fair and bright, Winter has another flight. If Candlemas brings clouds and rain,

Winter will not come again.

I also found an old Scottish saying:

If Candlemas Day is bright and clear,

There'll be two winters in the year.

So, it seems that the groundhog uses the same prediction system as the older Candlemas system – sunny day means more winter; cloudy day means winter is just about finished.

In the United States, the first reported use of the groundhog as a predictor was said to be in 1841 when the groundhog was reported to have predicted the weather "on Candlemas Day." By 1887, however, the press had removed the word "Candlemas" and the day became merely, "Groundhog Day."

This seems to be just another example of quite an old Catholic tradition that has been unbaptized by modern society. Maybe Catholic calendars could at least put, "Candlemas/Groundhog Day." After all, it is a Candlemas weather prediction that the groundhog mimics.
